Peter Hasselbacher (Hazelbacher)

Conscripted Hessian Soldier from Ansbach, Bavaria.

The following correspondence comes from the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association Collection now housed in the Archives and Special Collections Department at the Shadek-Fackenthal Library of Franklin & Marshal College. The file was kindly provided by provided by Mr. Mike Lear. It is my understanding that the attached represents the entire contents of Box #24, Folder #30 devoted to Peter Hasselbacher.

My personal interest is to track the family history of Peter back into Germany. All the Hasselbacher family lines I have been able to identify so far in the United States come from a relatively small area of Franconia (Bavaria) Germany. This includes the towns of Diespeck, Neustadt, Puschendorf, Gunzendorf, Herzogaurach, Emskirchen, etc. The conscripted soldier Peter comes from Ansbach. Hasselbachers I contacted currently living in that area of Germany assume that they are all related and some have traced their roots back to a refugee from Austria in the mid 1600's. My known roots go back only to around 1750 in Diespeck. (My ancestor Georg Hasselbacher lived there, but was apparently not born there.)

I am mildly disappointed that these attached records are predominantly related to Peter's American descendants. However, I am happy to help distribute them in hopes that some reader will have additional information about Peter's European roots (or other Hasselbacher families in Germany) and will contact me.

The Hasselbachers of America.

Where we came from.

If your name or that of a relative is Hasselbacher or Hazelbacher, the chances are good that we are all related. All the Hasselbacher lines I have been able to find came from a relatively small area of Franconia in northern Bavaria. In my retirement I have started to fill in gaps of family history that I thought were lost to me forever. Help me connect the dots. Here are the origins of the Hasselbacher immigrants I have been able to find.

Peter Hasselbacher (Hazelbacher) born March 22, 1759 in Ansbach. Came over in 1779. Conscripted to fight for the English as a Hessian soldier in the Revolutionary War. He settled in **Pennsylvania**. There are many of his descendants around and good documentation including some information about his parents.

John Peter Hasselbacher immigrated to **Peoria County Illinois** in 1857 with his wife Eva Maria Gundaker. John Peter was born in Herzogaurach, Bavaria in 1828. There are lots of their descendants still in Illinois and elsewhere. A relative in Germany, Fritz, has an interest in genealogy and did extensive research in Germany. This line is well connected back to the 1650s and may be the root of all of us.

Johann Hasselbacher, born 1848 in Diespeck immigrates to **Red Cloud, Nebraska** in 1871. He starts a sizable family and there are records. Unfortunately I have not had any contact with any descendant. One individual, Vernon, had an interest in family history but died several years ago. This family line is related to me.

Conrad Hasselbacher was born in Nurnberg in 1893 but his father Johann was from Diespeck. Conrad was my grandfather. He came with his family to **Bloomfield, New Jersey** in 1924. There are a dozen or so descendants all well known to me.

Lines that are lost to me.

Andreas Freidrich Hasselbacher, a barrel-maker and son of a barrel-maker, was born in Diespeck Germany in 1830. He is one of several individuals of the Diespeck Hasselbachers to come to America. He and his family show up in **Cincinnati** in the 1880 Census. His wife is Katharina Popp von Adelsdorf, and their children are: Anna Katharina, Johann Konrad, Maria Katharina, Johann Georg, Anna Margareta, and Kunigunda: all born in Diespeck. I have not yet identified a single member of this line. There has to be some of you out there! This family line is related to me.

Margareta Barbara Hasselbacher, born 1832 a single mother, and her son Johann Konrad Hasselbacher, b 1854, come to the USA in 1855. Margareta is sister to Andreas Friedrich above. I have no knowledge where she settled down or what happened to her. This family line would be related to me.

J. A. Hasselbacher, his wife Cath?, daughter Bertha (or Rutha), and son “unreadable but maybe Ludwig” come over in June 1884 from Hamburg. This is from a passenger list to New York. Nothing else is known about this family by me.

The entire German and American Hasselbacher lineage may have begun with Wolff Hasselbacher, a religious refugee from Gresten, Austria to Oberrossbach, Germany in the mid 1600s. Oberrossbach is a stones throw from Diespeck and Neustadt. The Hasselbachers I found in that area today think all the Hasselbachers in Germany are related through this line. I would love to find the details! Can you help me?

Thank you for the information on Peter Hazelbacher (Hasselbacher). We will add it to our file on Peter with the collection being held and managed at Franklin and Marshall College at Lancaster, PA.

Since the information you have is slightly different from ours as shown in our website Registry of German Auxiliary Soldiers, I wonder if you can elaborate on your statements attributed to family tradition. What can you offer to substantiate his escape after Yorktown and being protected by Daniel Shively? Do you have his record of marriage to Elizabeth?

One of our researchers believes Peter was taken to NYC and deserted from there. Perhaps he found his way back to VA, although that seems unlikely. Your information may be closer to the truth.

If you are not a member of the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association, please join and consider applying for a Certificate and submitting a Profile on Peter for a future issue of our Journal. We hope to have Articles or Profiles on as many of the German Auxiliary Soldiers who remained in America as we can induce living descendants to write and submit. Our mission is to document and preserve the records of those men and their families.

DURING THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR ABOUT THE YEAR, WHILE THE OFFICERS OF THE DUKE OF BRUNSWICK (PROBABLY BRAUNSCHWEIG), THE LAND GRAVE OF HESSE CASSEL, THE HEREDITARY PRINCE OF CASSEL AND THE COUNT OF HANNAH (PROBABLY HANAU), WAS DRAFTING A REGIMENT OF GRENADIERS FOR THE KING OF ENGLAND, GEORGE III, PETER HAZELBAKER WAS STANDING IN THE CROWD OF SPECTATORS WHEN HE WAS CALLED ACROSS THE STREET AND COMMANDED TO "STEP UNDER THE STANDARD". HE MEASURED SIX FT ONE AND $\frac{3}{4}$ INCHES IN HEIGHT BLACK EYES AND HAIR, AND DARK COMPLETED, HE WAS A LITTLE TOO TALL, BUT THE OFFICER SAID HE "WOULD DO". HE WAS 18 OR 19 YEARS OF AGE, AND SAID TO BE THE ONLY SON OF HIS MOTHER, A WIDOW. THIS HAPPENED IN ANSBACH, PROVINCE OF BAVARIA, GERMANY. ENGLAND PAID FOR EACH SOLDIER A SUBSIDY OF SEVEN POUNDS FOUR SHILLINGS FOUR PENCE AND TWICE THAT FOR ALL WHO WERE KILLED,

COMING TO AMERICA, PETER WAS TAKEN PRISONER AT YORKTOWN, WHEN LORD CORNWALLIS SURRENDERED. WHEN THE EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS TOOK PLACE PETER WAS HIDDEN IN THE BARN OF ONE DANIEL SHIVELY OF BERKELEY COUNTY VIRGINIA, ? NOW WEST VIRGINIA. AND WAS NEVER EXCHANGED. PETER MARRIED ELIZABETH, DAUGHTER OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED SHIVELY, AND SETTLED NEARBY.

During the Revolutionary War, about the year 1779, while the officers of the Duke of Brunswick, the Landgrave of Hesse Cassel, the hereditary Prince of Cassal, and Count of Hannau, was drafting a regiment of grenadiers for the king of England, George III, Peter Hazelbaker was standing in the crowd of spectators, when he was called across the street and commanded to "Step under the standard". He measured six feet one and three fourths inches in height, black eyes and hair, and dark complected. He was a little too tall, but the officer said he "would do". He was 18 or 19 years of age and said to be the only son of his mother, a widow.

* This happened at Ansbach, province of Bavaria, Germany. England paid for each soldier a subsidy of seven pounds, four shillings, four pence, and twice that for all who were killed.

Coming to America, Peter was taken prisoner at Yorktown, when Lord Cornwallis surrendered. When the exchange of prisoners took place Peter was hidden in the barn of one Daniel Shively, of Berkeley County, Virginia, now West Virginia, and was never exchanged. BERKELEY

Peter, married Elizabeth, daughter of the above mentioned Shively, and settled near by. Here, were born to him six sons, John, Peter, Daniel, Abraham, George and Jacob. One night, while in bed, he was bitten by a spider. The doctor sent for was drunk and sent medicine, which, though it saved his life, left him paralyzed. Sometime later, with his family, Peter moved to Washington County, Penn., settling in Allen township. He died in 1800, at about the age of 38 years and was buried in a field near the present residence of Major Henry Sphar. WHERE AT.

① John, was born Sept. 16th, 1782, and died Sept. 21st, 1864. He was the first school teacher in Belle Vernon, Pa., using what is now the kitchen of the residence of the late Mrs. Mary Corwin as a school house. Later, he moved to New Market, Iowa, where he died. MAILED NAME WAS SMOCK

② Peter, died six weeks later than his father, and was buried beside him in the Sphar graveyard. THUS ABOUT 1800

③ Daniel was born about 1786. He married, and after some years, his wife dying he left his children in Pa., and moved to Blue Creek, Ohio, later moving to Summitville, Ind., where he died, leaving three sets of children. PRESUMED TO MEAN IN ALLEN TWP PA.

④ George, was born, Nov. 18th, 1790, and after outliving all his brothers died near the old home June 25th, 1880.

⑤ Abraham was born about 1794. He moved early in the century to Blue Creek, Ohio, where he died. 1792

⑥ Jacob, was born about 1796. He was a shoemaker and lived many years near the old home, moving in 1848 to near Perryopolis, where he died soon after. PENNA.

In the early days of Bellevue Andrew Dunlevy and his brother-in-law Geo. Hazelbaker carried on the manufacture of hats in the house at that time known as the Billiter house on Water below Third street. It was truly a manufactory as all the work was done by hand power. They not only made the popular wool hat of that day but also the fine fur hat. The wool hat did a boy an undesirable long service. There seemed to be no wear out to it, as it was the custom at that day to iron over and shape anew the hat whenever it became discolored or presented an unseemly appearance. The fine fur hat was also subjected to a renovating process that made it good as new. This firm was the market for rabbit and mink skins, from which the fine fur hat was manufactured. Caps and mufflers, so called, were made from coon and fox skins with the tails as ornamental appendages.

Andrew Dunlevy was born July 24, 1795, on the farm now owned by his son Jehu in Allen Township, Washington County, Pa. He died July 24, 1879, in the house still standing a few rods distant from the spot where he was born. The farm is situated on the Monongahela river about one mile above Speer's ferry. This farm was the home of his parents. His mother was a Crawford, sister of the wife of Col. Edward Cook well known in the early days of the "Forks" neighborhood. The wife of Andrew Dunlevy was a daughter of the older Wm. Jackman who was father also of the late Jehu and Simeon Jackman well known citizens of Washington County. Andrew had five sons and two daughters. Joseph died in his youth. Anthony was drowned many years ago in Galveston Bay. William married a Furnier and resides in the west. Crawford married a lady in Brownsville, and has resided for some years near the hot springs, in Arkansas. Barbara married S. T. Williams, well known in former years in this vicinity; they now live in Iowa. The remaining daughter was accidentally burned to death. Jehu resides on the homestead, and is one

of the solid farmers of Allen township. His first wife was a daughter of the late Hugh McKee; his present wife was a Smith from the Youghiogheny valley. Andrew Dunlevy's wife died in 1845.

Andrew by birth and profession was a Presbyterian in religion. At his birth Dr. Ralston had not commenced his ministry at Horseshoe Meeting House, now only known by the rough stones that mark the graves of the early settlers. Dr. James Finley had just closed his earthly labors as pastor of Rehoboth, where Dunlevy's parents were accustomed to worship with his uncle, Col. Cook. Dunlevy was one of the number who organized, about 1840, the Maple Creek Presbyterian Church, and during its existence was a member of the sessions.

In the eldership of that church he was associated with such men as Moss, Baker, McJunkin and Simeon Jackman, all of whom have passed to the beyond. In politics Dunlevy was always a Democrat of the Jeffersonian school, and even the Know Nothing allurements of 1854 could not entice him from his inborn Democracy. He always possessed the confidence of his fellow citizens as an upright Christian gentleman. Honest in habit, generous in heart, kind in disposition and devoted to his country and church, he was ranked among those whose place it would be hard to fill. His remains were buried along side those of his wife in the Speer's graveyard, opposite Bellevue.

Peter Hazelbaker immigrated to this country from Anspach, in Germany, as an English soldier during the revolution. He was taken prisoner by the American forces, was never exchanged, and at the close of the war he settled in the United States. Shortly after the war Peter married Elizabeth Shively, daughter of Daniel Shively, of Berkeley county, Va., now West Virginia.

After their marriage Peter and his wife immigrated to BERKELEY

Washington County, Pa., and settled in an old log house on the farm now owned by one of the heirs of S. A. Chester, in Allen Township. He died in 1800 and his remains are buried in the field just above the present residence of Major Henry Spharr. Peter had six sons, Peter, Daniel, John, Jacob, Abraham and George. John was an old time school teacher. He taught the first school in Belleverson. The kitchen part of the residence of the late Aunt Polly Corwin on Main street was the schoolhouse. He and Daniel died in the West. Peter died six weeks after the death of his father and was buried in the same graveyard. Abraham died near Brush Creek in Ohio. Jacob was well known in the community. He was a shoe-maker by trade and lived many years in the stone house just above Belleverson now owned by R. C. Schmertz & Co. About 1848 he removed to a farm near Perryopolis where he died. George lived beyond all of his brothers. He was born in Berkeley County, West Va., January 18, 1790. His wife was Matilda Dunlevy sister of Andrew Dunlevy. She died in 1853. After his marriage he erected the lower part of the old house on Main street in Belleverson where now stands the house owned by A. L. Brown and occupied by Abe Lewis. In the old house George and his wife first set up housekeeping and there he carried on the hat business until he and Dunlevy started the shop in the Billiter house. He also resided for a time on the Gould farm, then on the Levi Johnson, then on the Rutan farm opposite Columbia owned now by W. J. Mann. He moved from this farm to the Cooper farm near the mouth of Maple Creek and finally in 1841 he purchased the farm on which he died, in Allen township, from Abia Allen and Robert Stockdale.

His son Andrew married a daughter of Thomas Fryc and died about the year 1856 near Lock No. 4. Joseph died at the homestead unmarried. Anthony lived for many years in the house near the mouth of Maple Creek now owned by Charles Baltze. He carried on the flouring mill which stood between the dwelling and the present bridge. The mill has passed

away. Anthony over thirty years ago moved to Illinois where he died a few years since. Jacob married a Miss Crow and lives in Clarion County. George married a Miss Riggs and lives on part of the homestead and John resides in Allen township not far from Wood's Run.

Matilda married Joseph Wolf and resides in the west. Mary married Jehu Cooper, now deceased. She lives in Illinois. Sarah Ann is the wife of Addison Cummings, of Allen township. Margaret married R. C. Guffey and died in North Belleverson. George Hazelbaker, the father of this large family, died on the home farm, June 23, 1880. He united with Rehoboth church in his seventy-fifth year and remained in that membership until his death. He was a good citizen, a genial neighbor, and above all a Christian. His remains were interred in Howe Cemetery.

THOMAS WARD AND FREDERICK COOPER.

Thos. Ward built the first house in Belleverson. In the summer of 1815 he purchased the lot on the corner of Main and Second streets, now owned by Howard McClure and Mrs. Kittle, and built thereon the well known house now moved to the upper end of the lot, and occupied now (1893) by James Haggerty's widow. Before moving into this house Ward resided in the old house that stood near the present home of Wm. Kyle in North Belleverson.

He was a most skillful mechanic in every art of making in wood. He was born May 23, 1776, but where we cannot say, or just when he came to this vicinity. He lived to a good old age in Belleverson, and when the decrepitude of age prevented his earning his own living he was kindly taken to the household of his children in Ohio, where some thirty years ago he died. His wife was a daughter of the old Frederick Cooper who settled about 1768 on the farm lately owned by Thomas Redd, and the farm of Robert McKain, both of which now form the site of the flourishing town of Charleroi. This settlement was made after the death of his first wife. On this farm

Dear Mr. White:

Your letter dated 30 June regarding the Ansbach soldier Peter Hasselbacher arrived while I was out of town.

My correspondence on this file goes back to 22 Sept. 1987. For the first several years we were chasing a non-existent soldier by the name of SHIVELY. It was not until 1990, that the inquirers determined they were looking for said Peter Hasselbacher and not SHIVELY!

One must know, in depth, what the service record of the Ansbach/Bayreuth troops was before he or she is in a position to make any judgment on the obvious myth about Hasselbacher "hiding out" on the farm of Daniel Schaublin. You need to read in depth, "A Hessian Diary of the American Revolution by Johann Conrad Doehla", which was translated by Bruce E. Burgoyne, and published by the University of Oklahoma Press. Perhaps you can secure an "inter-library loan" of the book at your local library or at a University Library.

This diary, written by a Co. Clerk of the Bayreuth Regt. gives one an excellent background of what transpired after the A/B troops were captured at the Battle of Yorktown in Oct. 1781--their POW status in Winchester, VA (for 4 or 5 months) and then at Frederick, MD. until May 20, 1783.

Many of the POWs went out voluntarily to work for farmers in MD and VA. Some returned and others did not. Perhaps PH was one of those "out on a pass" but did not return by 20 May 1783. On the British records, PH is listed as "missing" in June 1783. Unfortunately, the American records were destroyed. At that time the POWs were repatriated and were back on Long Island--thus the information given to you by Mr. Webler.

As far as I can determine, no record of Peter's marriage was ever found, except for a mention that there was a "bible" with some data. No photo copies were forthcoming. I do not know if the church records or the marriage bonds for VA were ever searched. Generally, valid and good Virginia records exist, but one must be on the site and be willing to do one's homework--rather a difficult task for you living in Kamloops.

I do have some data on the Shively land dealings which indicated that PH may have lived in what is now West Virginia (then officially part of VA.) before going to Western PA.

If you want copies of the "real data" I have which lists references, I will photo copy it as time permits. The cost will be \$30 per hour, payable to JSHA Inc. Enclosed are copies of two letters I wrote to what appeared to be "truly interested" individuals, but never received a reply.



In this regard, the website record suggests he was recorded as missing (captured or deserted 1783) and yet his marriage is recorded in 1781.

I have record of approximately 730 HAZELBAKER's in America, all descendant from Peter and many more that must be, but cannot yet be positively connected to the family, and I would be pleased to assist any interested genealogist with my information. Please let me know if there is a fee for assistance with the information requested.

Dear Mark,

Thank you for your reply of last June. To answer your question: Yes, we did move. For a number of reasons, we moved here to live on the old John Shively farm, established in 1832 by my g.g. grandfather. The current farm house is on top of the ridge. The remains of John's homestead, barn and cemetery are located near the bottom of the ridge, where they found water. We get our water by truck, to be pumped out of a cistern. We are attempting to renovate both the current house and the farm....a bit much for retired folks. At times, we have "help" - a mischievous ghost. Her name is Hannah. She is my g.g grandmother.

Enough of that. Please may I ask for your help in answering a question? Do you know, or can you tell me where I might find the answer to why some early Germans named their sons John?

Example: The sons of Michael and Christine Shively were all given the first name of John, although records indicate they used their second given name. The names of the children, as taken from baptismal records were:

Eva Dorthea Schauffle, b. 1740
John Christian Schäufole, b. 1746
John Schäufole, b. 1749
John Jacob Scheiffele, b. 1751
John Heinrich Scheiffele, b. 1759 (This is the non-Hessian Henry.)

Having grown up in Southern California, I am quite accustomed to some of the Mexican people giving their children the first name of Jesus or Maria, for religious purposes. As yet, I have found nothing in literature that indicates if the Germans did this for a similar reason. When inquiring, all I have learned is that "some early Germans did name their sons John".

Is there a religious significance to this? Were the sons named John, in belief they were asking John the Baptist to aid the boys in life?? Was the daughter named Eva for a religious reason? Was this the custom of a certain religion, in a particular area and time frame??

Nothing earth shaking. Just a question that won't go away.

OUR HESSIAN CONNECTION

On October 2, 1906, William Fletcher Shively, Sr., wrote a letter to his nephew, W.D. Bretz, stating..... "Grandfather Shively (Henry) was one of five brothers, (Christian, Jacob, Henry and two others) who came to America in the time of the Revolutionary War, as mercenaries of King George and when General Washington crossed the Delaware River and defeated them at Trenton and took a thousand of the Hessians as prisoners, they were among the number that laid down their arms and fought for the colonies until peace was made." (DESCENDANTS OF HENRY AND MARY BANTA SHIVELY, by Lottie Compton McDowell, 1972)

This one statement has caused many to search for their Hessian ancestors. Both American and German records have been scoured. Mark Schwalm, of the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association, has been contacted numerous times...to no avail. Today, we do not know the source of this idea, or why W.F. Shively would have written such. We do know the Hessian soldiers were here in 1776. Michael and Christina Schäuffle (Shively), parents of Henry, were living in Berkeley Co., Virginia before 1747. Henry was born 27 Jan 1759, York Co., PA. Following W.F. Shively's letter, there is a note by Lottie McDowell. "Many of the statements concerning the Shively family made by W.F. Shively have been proven wrong." Yet, the fabrication persists.

In an attempt to find a reasonable answer to the question, the following has been learned:

Correspondence received from the Staatsarchiv of the Canton of Basel, Switzerland and Hessisches Staatsarchiv of Marburg, Germany, contains information from the HETRINA Series, Book 4 of a HENRICH SCHIEBE, b. 1746/47, Burghagen, Germany, who served in the military as a Private, Courier Corps, in the Company of Phillip of Wurmb. He deserted in June 1778.

In answer to our query to Mark Schwalm, of the Johannes Schwalm Historical Association, Inc, he gave us the additional information that there was a CONRAD SCHEIBE and a DIEDRICH SCHILBE captured at Trenton. Conrad Scheibe served as a Private, Regt, Lieb Co., V. Lossberg, sent to Philadelphia PA. Diedrich Schilbe, Corporal, Regt. Lieb Co., V. Lossberg, sent to Philadelphia. PA. Records indicate that neither of these men deserted their units.

No where in the American, German or Swiss records are there records of five Shively brothers serving during the Revolutionary War.

Dr. Lloyd Bockstruck, in his lectures, speaks about the Hessian troops. The American forces made it easy for them to desert. Tobacco leaves, wrapped in a German written propaganda flyer, offering land and opportunities for those who would desert, were left where the soldiers would find them. The deserters were well treated. They were often "farmed out" to the local people, particularly those of German heritage. General George Washington paraded them through the towns, so the residents could see for themselves that these German soldiers were not to be feared or hated, but were young men - like their sons, and farmers - like themselves. The prisoners were trusted with such positions as paymaster for the American troops; being the personal bodyguards for General George Washington. (Why? You couldn't tell an Patriot from a Loyalist sympathizer, but you knew a German when you saw one in uniform.)

At the end of the War, the soldiers were repatriated. This is when the true extent of the desertion was known. Peter Hasselbacher/Hazelbaker was one of those who chose not to return to Germany. He had been ordered to join a Regiment of Grenadiers, for George III, King of England. This was in Ansbach, Province of Bavaria, Germany. It was about 1779. Peter was 18 or 19 years old, and the only son of his widowed mother. From the German records - DIE ANSBACH-BAYREUTHER TRUPPEN IM AMERIKANISCHEN, Peter served as a Private, Company 4, Ansbach Regt. Upon reaching America, he served under the command of Lord Cornwallis. At some point, Peter was taken prisoner.

Peter may have been one of those who were placed in the custody of the local people. In this case, perhaps with Daniel Shively, of Berkeley County, Virginia. Following the cessation of hostilities, the prisoners were exchanged. Peter did not participate in the exchange, but rather, hid in Daniel Shively's barn. It was then, June of 1783, that Peter was officially listed as a deserter. Peter married Daniel's daughter, Elizabeth, thus making him our "Hessian Connection", and possibly the only one.

Peter and Elizabeth settled near her parents. They had six sons, and possible a daughter, Mary. Peter, b.-- ; John, b. 16 Sept 1782; Daniel, b. ca. 1786; George, b. 18 Nov 1790; Abraham b. 1794; and Jacob, b. ca. 1796. According to family history, Peter was bitten by a spider, while in bed. The doctor was sent for, but being drunk, sent medicine for Peter. The medicine did save Peter's life, but it left him paralyzed. Sometime after that, Peter and his family moved to Allen Township, Washington County, Pennsylvania. There, Peter died in 1800, about the age of 38 years. He was buried in the Spahr/Spor family cemetery.

His secret emigration and that of (his brother Jacob) is announced in a report of the Obervogt, read in Council May 14, 1749.....in which it is presumed that they went to Pennsylvania. His own emigration is confirmed by RL 1753: First from Daniel Schaublin of Waldenburgh who went to the newly-found land 3 years ago and at present inherited 50 pounds from his grandfather.....Jacob Schaublin, smith..... also emigrated recently according to the same report of May 14.....The two schaublins took their wives and children along.

The name of Daniel Shively II appears as Daniel Scheubly in passenger list 139C for the ship ANN which landed in Philadelphia 28 Sept 1749 (Strassburger and Hinke, 1934 V. 1, p. 416).

Other records on Daniel Shivel II are the deeds of lease and release by which Nicholas Lemas (Ishman?) and wife Christian sold a 234 acre tract of land to Daniel Shively II in Frederick Co., VA on 8 Nov 1758 (Frederick Co. Deed Book 5, p. 182-187, Winchester, VA) On 4 Aug 1762 Daniel Shively II sold 100 acres of this tract, described as "lying in Frederick Col on both sides of the wagon road that leads from Swearingens Ferry to Winchester" for 30 pounds to his son Daniel Shively III and Jacob Choomy (Tschumi) Frederick Co Deed Book 7, p. 261-264.

Daniel Shively II made his will on 18 Apr 1763 (Frederick Co, Will Book 3 p.122 and an inventory of his estate was made on 20 June 1763 (Will Book 3 p. 314-315 In his will Daniel II gave bequests of 5 shillings to each of the following children as listed on other side

The balance of his estate was left to his wife Christian (Christina). In an account of his estate recorded 6 June 1766, the total expenses were given as L-40-3-6, including an item: L-4 for coffin, liquor and other funeral expenses. Frederick Co., VA Will Book 3 p. 345

It is apparent the Daniel Shively's II first wife, Margaret, had died and had been replaced by Christina. The list of the children is remarkable in that it includes all of the same children, in order, as recorded in the Waldenburgh baptismal register. Evidently all were still living in 1763.

The Memorial and Petition of a number of Inhabitants of Kentuckey Settlement of the Low Dutch Reformed Church persuasion in behalf of themselves and other intended settlers.
Humbly sheweth.

That in the Spring of the year(smudge)80, they moved to Kentuckey with their families and effects with a view and expectation to procure a tract of Land to enable them to settle together in a-body for the convenciency of civil society and propogating the Gospel in their known language: when they arrived there to their sorrow and disappointment they were thro' the dangerousness of the times by a cruel savage Enemy oblinded to settle in Sations or Forts in such places where there was the most appearance of safety, notwithstanding all their precatation numbers of them suffered greatly in their property, several killed and others captivated by the Enemy. living in such distressed confined way always in danger, frequently on Military duty, it was impossible for them to do more than barely support their families with the necessaries of life, by which means they are much reduced. and what adds more to their disappointment and affliction is that contrary to their expectations before their arrival and since, the most or all the Tillable Land has been located and monopolised by persons that had the advantage of your Memorialish by being acquainted, (with the country) and your Memorialish being strangers and confined as aforesaid and being so reduced are rendered unable to purchase Land at the advanced price, and especially in a body conveniently together agreeable to their wishes. Whereas Providence has been pleased to prosper and support the virtuous resistance of the United States in the glorious cause of Liberty, which has enabled them to obtain an Honorable Peace whereby they have obtained a large extent of unappropriated Territory. and whereas it is currently and repeatedly reported amongst us that Congress has broke or made void Virginia's right or claim to Land in Kentuckey Settlement.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray, (in behalf of themselves and other intended settlers of that persuasion) the Honourable Congress would indulge them with a grant of a Tract or Toritory of Land in Kentuckey Settlement if the Virginia claim (smudge) should be mad(smudge) void, or otherwise in the late ceded land on (smudge) northwest side of the Ohio River: whereto there is not any prior legal claim to enable them to settle in a body together, (smudge) able terms as Congress in their wisdom and prudence shall see justs and reasonable, they complying with, and performing all reasonable conditions required. To enable them to put their intended plan and purpose in execution, they

having principally in view the glory of God. The promotion of Civil and Religious society, educating and instructing their raising generation in the principals of religion and morality: hoping the Honorable Congress will give all due encouragement to such a laudable under taking. The (smudge) duly considered. Your Petitioners as in duty-bound shall ever pray. (mark)

From Lottie McDowell's research: Henry Shively, b. 1760, married Mary Banta, daughter of Hendrick Banta and Anna Demarest, 15 March 1783, at Harrodsburg (Fort Harrod) Kentucky. Mary, b. 31 March 1767 at Bedminister, New Jersey, was baptized at the Dutch Church in Somerset, New Jersey.

Tax lists and census records show Henry Shively residing in:
- Jefferson County: 23 April 1789, 15 June 1790
Shelby County: 29 August 1800, 1810, 1820
Jefferson County: 1830, 1840

These county differences coincide with the changes in county lines.

Webster's Dictionary, 1926: The term "SHEWETH" comes from the old term "SHEW", meaning to show or to serve.

HANDBOOK OF DENOMINATIONS IN THE UNITED STATES by Frank S. Mead, Nashville, 1975: The Dutch Reformed Church began during the time of the Reformation in Switzerland. The Reformed Church spread into the Netherlands during a long and bitter Dutch struggle against Catholic Spain. The Reformed Church moved overseas, and in 1614 had an unorganized membership near Fort Orange (Albany) New York. The Revolution had little effect on the church. after having forwarded your letter to the state archives of the canton of Basle-Country at first, it was returned to us these days by our fellow archivists in Liestal with an explanatory letter, which enlightened us as to its purpose, which was not at all clear before.

Unfortunately we are not able to provide lists of soldiers from Basle in foreign service, as there do not exist any. We are not even able to trace an emigration of five Schäublin brothers to either England, Hesse or the U.S. People, who wanted to join foreign armies, at that time for purely mercenary reasons mostly, usually did not ask the government's permission to do so.

So, if you are not able to give us more information about those five brothers, as e.g. their christian names, birth dates, parentage, there is no hope for further progress in this research.

Thank you for your letter of October 29, 1987 regarding Peter Hazelbaker/Hasselbach. I will try and answer your questions.

Land Records - I have been to Washington Co., Pa. three times and cannot locate Peter in any type of ownership - or tax lists.

Washington Co., Pa. or all the Counties in that SW corner of Pa. was claimed by Virginia. I have assumed that this is possibly the area the Hazelbakers were in - and would show up on Virginia records during that time period. Virginia Court Records in Southwestern Pennsylvania by Crumrine state that 'the old court of Monongalia County were unfortunately destroyed by fire before any transcription was undertaken'. (which could possibly be the area they were)

Peter and Elizabeth's son John was born 16 September, 1782 - so they had to marry 1780/81. (I have copy of John's Bible Record of his family.)

I might add, and old undocumented History states that Peter escaped and was hiding in the barn of Daniel Shively.

Data on Daniel Shively - he bought 2 or 3 lots in town of Winchester, Frederick Co., Va., in 1753 from Thomas Lord Fairfax (Frederick Co., Deed Book 18, p. 323-325). On 4 Aug. 1752, he and his father-in-law, Jacob Tschumi, bought a hundred acre tract of land, part of a tract of land lying on both sides of the wagon road that leads from Swearingens Ferry to Winchester, from Daniel Shively (his father) for £30 (Frederick Co., Va. Deed Book 7, p.161-164). On 18 April 1775 Jacob Tschumi deeded his interest in this 100 acre tract to Michael Close, his other son-in-law (Berkley Co., W.Va. Deed Bk. 3, p.287). Then on 20 March 1776, Close sold his half interest to Daniel Shively for £100, making Shively sole owner (Berkely Co. Deed Bok 3 p.529)

In 1782, Jacob Tschumi died, and in his will reiterated Daniel Shively's full claim to 100 acre tract now in Berkley County, described as on the "Main Road about five miles from Mecklenburg," (now Shepherdstown W.Va.) (Berkley Co., Will Bk. 1 p.304/5).

On 2 Feb. 1795, Daniel Shively and Barbara, his wife, of "the parish of Norboone, County of Berkley" conveyed to Jacob Snyder the 100 acre tract. 20 March 1795, he was granted a patent on a 345 acre tract in Pike Run twp., Washington Co., Pa. On 3 April 1795, he sold lot 108 in town of Winchester.

did you find the records in New Shively?

Page 2 -

I have not been able to find any Parish Records for that part of Virginia. Nor, have I been able to get to the Virginia Library for further research.

The new 1787 Census of Virginia of "The Personal Property Tax List" by Netti Schreiner-Yantis and Florene Love has not disclosed any listing on Peter Hazelbaker.

I have nothing to prove that Peter Hasselbach was captured at the Battle of Yorktown in Oct., 1781. I have not researched in Maryland but very little.

I have not been to the Court House in Frederick Co., Va. - or Berkley Co.. did look at microfilm (5 rolls) ordered out of Morgantown library on Berkley Co. - NOTHING. In marriages, I found only where Elizabeth's sister Margaret md. a Nicholas Plug/Pluck in 1782 Berkley Co., Va.. However, in any of the published material for Frederick Co., Va., I find no marriage - just nothing.

I have been trying to compile all the descendants of Peter - but have found that is impossible, so am going to give up and start getting organized what I have. Except, I would like to find something of record that shows Peter existed in this Country - also to find the name of wife (1st) of Daniel Hazelbaker, my GGG Grandmother. The Genealogy Society there in Washington Co., Pa. has a book in their Library of all names mentioned in Wills for that County - and nothing appears.


I could go on of the things that I have looked thru - I plan to try and search Stark Co., Ohio - since Daniel married there in 1821. History states he left his children by first wife in Pa. and returned for them before going West. (suppose he left them with his Mother - Mrs. Ralph Smith. I was looking for this name on census to see if I could account to their being in Pa.. No Ralph Smith.) That Daniel really moved around - 1830 census in Tuscarawas Co., Ohio - along about 1833/34 on tax list in Fayette Co., Pa. as Blacksmith, and in 1840 Delaware Co., Ind. census, where son Henry moved in 1838.

Seems like Daniel Shively's children all migrated over into Jefferson Co., Wayne Twp., Ohio - except Elizabeth Hazelbaker Smith. Will shows children: John, Daniel, Barbara Jackman, Margaret Pluck, Mary Spar, Elizabeth Hazelbaker. He ordered land sold and be divided among John, Daniel, Grandson John Hazelbaker, Mary Spar, Barbara Jackman. \$60.00 of land sale to Margaret Pluck and \$1.00 to Elizabeth Hazelbaker. (Daniel must have really been unhappy with Elizabeth) I was disappointed that I could not find probate proceedings in Jefferson Co. on Daniel's Will. His wife Barbara died in ca. 1823/24 as that is when the land was sold.

I hope this gives you an idea on my research - and am certain that I have probably missed some areas. I pursued the descendants of Peter in hopes that some kind of family records might have been handed down to one of the lineages.

Washington Co., Pa. History by Beers Page 743 - states Mrs. Elizabeth H. (Shiveley) Hazelbaker, a widow, married a Ralph Smith, born in East Pike Run Twp., Washington Co., Pa. and bore him four children, and that she died in 1850 and was interred in the Quaker Cemetery in East Bethlehem township; in 1858 she was followed by her husband (Ralph Smith) who was buried in the Baptist cemetery at Washington.
(this article is on Joseph Smith and gives outline of the Smith Family)

I have not been able to find anything on Peter Hazelbaker or the Ralph Smith in any records Washington Co., Pa.. I estimate she married 1803/4 to Ralph. I have found nothing in the Quaker Records of Pa.. (the family has been Methodist as far back as family knows).
