News From Germany

Doug Eglen and Lynette Hazelbaker of Kentucky, have corresponded with a german genealogist who agreed, for a fee, to do some reseach on our Peter Hasselbacher. This was in 1984/85, the genealogist contacted was Reinhard Mayer. Some of the records reseached were The Nurnberg Archives for church records and military records. A military book by a Erhard Stadler lists a Peter Hasselbacher as a deserter because he never returned to Germany. There are some old volumes of the old gazette of Ansbach Dukedom concerning the time 1781-1790 in the Ansbach Library. We think Peter went with the Ansbach-Bayreuth troops and not with the Hessian soldiers, as previously thought.

Reinhard Mayer contacted another genealogist who has worked on the Hasselbacher family tree, his result: All Hasselbacher families of Ansbach area originate from a Stefan Hasselbacher, living in 1608 in Gresten Parish (Austria). His son Wolfgang Hasselbacher emigrated, for reasons of his protestant creed, in 1666 to Unterschweinach (in Ansbach area). He died in 1674, he had two brothers Adam and Andreas who also emigrated to Ansbach area. Peter is the descendant of Wolfgang, Adam, or Andreas. The direct linage of Wolfgang is as follows: Wolfgang's son is Paul, born in Dottenheim in 1672 Paul's son is Johann Paul born in Stubach in 1706 Johann P.'s son is Johann Adam born in Rehweiler in 1751. Johann A.'s daughter is Anna Maria born in Ansbach in 1787.

Lloyd Hazelbaker's daughter was in the Ansbach area recently and in the Ansbach phone book was listed one Hans Hasselbacher! So when the hostage problem in Europe settles down, let's go!

Thank you, Doug Eglen and Lynette Hazelbaker for sharing your info from the Motherland! The next issue of THE HAZELBAKER NEWS in Aug. 87 will have a german update, as I have written to Reinhard.





For 25 years he was a machinist for Trailmobile in Cincinnati before moving to Parrish in the mid 1950's.


For nearly 30 years, 'Big George', as he was known locally, operated an orange grove in Parrish, selling fruit from his stand and grove.

He was active in community affairs and church work.


Survivors include sons Lloyd, Frank, and George III, all from Manatee County; a daughter Gladys Riley, Cincinnati; and 13 grandchildren.



Batavia youth shows he has the 'right stuff' at camp

The January explosion of the Space Shuttle Challenger may have placed the national space program on hold temporarily, but youngsters across the United States still dream of traveling in space one day.

Just ask Batavia resident Brad Hazelbaker.

Brad, 14, was one of 140 lucky youngsters from across the United States to prove they had the 'right stuff' at a U.S. Space Camp held recently

at the Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama.

For five days, Hazelbaker got the chance of a lifetime to learn about the principles of rocket flight, study the history of the manned space flight program and train on much of the same equipment used by today's astronauts.

Brad, an eighth-grader at Batavia Junior High School, learned about the space camp through an advertisement in a magazine published by the Smithsonian Institute. He

wrote the space camp for details, applied, and was lucky enough to be accepted.

Brad said advance planning was the main reason he was taken

"I was lucky because I applied early," he said. "I applied before the movie ("Space Camp") came out and everyone wanted to go."

In addition to building and launching model rockets, touring the camp's space museum and visiting NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, campers were allowed to test some of the training equipment used to prepare astronauts for space flight.

Brad and the other campers got a taste of weightlessness in the "five degrees of freedom chair," and felt the forces of lift-off in a triple-gravity machine. Brad said the campers were told to try to lift their arms while in the gravity machine, but for him, the task was a little harder than for the others.

"I had just gotten out of the gift shop and I was carrying a bag with some stuff in it, so it was hard to lift that hand," Brad explained. "It felt like I had a twenty-pound weight on it."

In addition to trying the training machines, campers were given the chance to sample other experiences in the astronaut's life. For instance, dinner one evening consisted of freeze-dried "astronaut food," a chicken and rice concoction supposedly revived by hot water.

Brad said the dish wasn't exactly delicious.

"The water we used wasn't really hot enough, I guess," he said. "The good didn't get moist, so it was kind of crunchy. It wasn't too good."

The space camp concluded with a simulated shuttle mission in which the campers were given the opportunity to demonstrate the skills they learned that week. Brad was chosen to be the launch and landing director for his team's mission, monitoring the others by computer to see how they were performing.

His job might not have been as exciting as those who actually acted as astronauts in the simulated mission, but Brad wasn't envious. In fact, he hopes to become a technician for the space program someday, rather than an astronaut.

"I think it was more fun to be on the ground," he said. "It's more of a responsibility."

His parents, Alan and Sandy Hazelbaker, have already approved the mission.
